Prior to the start of the meeting, the Chair made announcements as follows:

- (i) Mr. B. Greaves would be representing the Police Authority on Leicester City Community Safety Partnership and that this would be his final meeting at Charnwood. He thanked Mr Greaves for the work he had undertaken at Charnwood and on behalf of the Partnership wished him well for the future.

Mr Greaves made a brief statement thanking the other members of the Partnership for their support and the officers for the way the Partnership was facilitated. The stretched targets would have an impact on the work of the

Partnership, with a greater emphasis on Anti-social Behaviour and he was confident that the Partnership would facilitate that.

- (ii) Ms Susan Taylor, the new Chief Executive at Charnwood Neighbourhood Housing was welcomed to the meeting. As the Chief Executive she was hoping to increase partnership working.
- (iii) Congratulations to the University in securing the base for Team GB for the 2012 Olympics. Reference was made to security difficulties and challenges and the role the Partnership would play, being well placed with W. Spinks a member of the Partnership.

## 1. MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 25th February 2010 were agreed.

## 2. MATTERS ARISING

- (i) Minute 2 – Matters Arising – Performance Update and Delivery Group Reports – DAAT Performance Data

Charnwood Neighbourhood Housing needle find data would be submitted to the Performance Group together with the data from the DAAT.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

- (ii) Minute 2 – Matters Arising – NHS Leicestershire County and Rutland

Officers were experiencing difficulties obtaining the data in respect of Loughborough Hospital and the Walk-in Centre and would continue to request the information.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

- (iii) Minute 3 – Performance Update and Delivery Group Reports

C. Woodward stated that the Partnership was still awaiting a response from Leicestershire County Council in respect of a Traffic Regulation Order from the Ministry of Transport, to allow the use of bus bays for taxis after 11.00pm each evening, for wider dispersal of taxi ranks in High Street, Loughborough.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

- (iv) Minute 4 – Anti-Social Behaviour – Community Safety Partnership Minimum Standards

The Domestic Burglary events had taken place, officers would ensure actions were followed up and would be reviewed through the Delivery Groups. An initial meeting of the Crime Group would be held on Friday, 16th April 2010 and Action Plans submitted to the next meeting of the Partnership.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

(vi) Minute 10 – Cats-Eyes Asset Tracker System

The Council had taken legal action in respect of the delivery of the outstanding order or the recovery of money. Officers were looking to find a new supplier.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

3. PERFORMANCE UPDATE AND DELIVERY GROUP REPORTS

During discussion of the figures, further comments on specific areas were made by Inspector McCabe, Inspector Southall and A. Fadesco as follows:

Domestic Burglary

In Loughborough LPU the reduction target had been maintained until October 2009. The latest nominal list was 64 and intelligence suggested that nominals from the Nottingham area were active within Loughborough LPU. There was a shrinking staff establishment and insufficient resources making the 15% reduction target for the year very challenging. Operation Umbel continued with nominals arrested and released on bail.

In Charnwood LPU nominals from Leicester City were in the area and officers were working with the City Police to address the situation. There had been a significant reduction in the number of offences since September 2009 and work continued with bordering LPUs, however the 15% reduction target would be challenging.

### Theft from Motor Vehicles

There had been an improvement in figures, with hot spots raised at the Performance Management Group.

### Theft of Motor Vehicle

Being first in the Family Group was good news. Many nominals were moving from vehicle crime to burglary.

### Robbery

The percentage increase masked the fact that it was only a small number of incidents.

### Serious Violent Crime

The night time economy was a key aspect of serious violent crime. As a Partnership much work had been undertaken during the previous twelve months. Operation Philby continued, with additional staffing on Friday and Saturday nights and good housekeeping of data.

### Hate Incidents

Reporting of incidents continued to rise, which was a positive.

### Anti-social Behaviour

Police figures showed reporting of incidents to be down, although Sentinal reporting had risen.

In Birstall there had been a significant reduction in anti-social behaviour, which had been the result of effective partnership working and the work of the Parish Council.

### Crave Survey Data

Work in the Peel Drive area had shown how engagement could result in higher satisfaction figures.

In reviewing the performance data, B. Greaves stated that overall the percentage figures were small, as were the variations and positions within the family group. Statistically the Partnership was significantly below in domestic burglary and significantly above in vehicle crime. There was no area in which the Partnership was significantly deteriorating. In respect of cycle theft, there had been a significant increase within Charnwood LPU and consideration should be given to making it a priority.

Reports from Delivery Groups were submitted as follows:

(i) Acquisitive Crime

There was nothing further to add following consideration of the matter as part of the performance data.

(ii) Violent Crime

T. McCabe and D. Southall made reference to the following matters:

- The report submitted showed that the group had had a successful year.
- In respect of domestic abuse, there had been positive work undertaken in the Hastings Ward, which should be replicated in other wards in the Borough, in particular with hard to reach groups. Discussions continued around funding for Woman's Aid.
- D. Southall would be taking over as Chair of the Group.

(iii) Anti-social Behaviour

W. Brown made reference to the following matters:

- Minimum Standards had been published. Partners were requested to forward details to W. Brown of how they supported the work, which could also be published.
- In respect of vulnerability, there was a field on sentinel to record the information to share with partners.
- The situation in Birstall had improved, although there were emerging issues in Thurmaston, where a multi-agency action plan had been developed and circulated to local residents and been well received.

In response to a question, S. Phipps stated that minimum standards were part of wider national data in respect of anti-social behaviour, case management and policies moving forward and a report on that matter would be submitted to the Partnership in June 2010.

The Chair made reference to agency data and the need to hold it in one hub, to avoid the possibility of losing data in different reporting systems.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

4. ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR / AUTISM TRAINING

A report in respect of Anti-social Behaviour / Autism training – 'The Alternative Incremental Approach', given as a multi-agency workshop was submitted. Following the workshop, with the endorsement of the Chief Executive of the National Autistic Society, the approach would be launched on 25th June 2010.

The report was welcomed and the work recognised as an excellent work model of good practice.

In response to a question, W. Brown stated that members of the Partnership had been invited to the launch on 25th June 2010, from 10.30 until lunchtime.

**AGREED** that the information be welcomed.

## 5. FUNDING

A report detailing funds currently received by the Partnership, together with funding proposals was submitted.

S. Phipps stated that it was the final report for the financial year, spending had increased, which was positive. The same funding allocation had been awarded for 2010/11. LAA level work had moved towards commissioning, which may affect the Partnership in the future, following the next Strategic Needs Assessment during the summer 2010.

Following the General Election the future of the LAA was unclear. Officers would brief the Partnership when information became available.

In response to questions, officers stated:

- (a) The £20,000 allocation for CCTV had been spent.
- (b) The evaluation of spending to ensure value for money would be completed by the end of April 2010.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

## 6. INTEGRATED OFFENDER MANAGEMENT

Sergeant J. Osborne gave a presentation in respect of Integrated Offender Management (copy filed with the agenda) and can be accessed at:

The pilot referred to in the presentation was grass roots management of a cohort of people in a priority neighbourhood. During the next twelve months the aim was to manage twelve offenders and try to move them away from crime, by addressing issues in respect of drug taking, housing and boredom.

The Chair referred to R. Holland from the Probation Service, who was a member of the IOM Board. Resources had been put into the scheme and consideration should be given as to how it could be replicated elsewhere.

In response to issues raised and questions, J. Osborne stated:

- (a) The majority of offences had been committed by local residents of the Ward.
- (b) The Integrated Offender Management Board met on a monthly basis to review each case.
- (c) T. McCabe chaired the IOM Board and R. Holland was vice-chair.
- (d) Up date reports could be submitted to the Partnership following the six and twelve month reviews of the pilot scheme.
- (e) Melton and Charnwood Borough Councils were working on a project to support ex-offenders who had been in prison for less than twelve months, with an aim to stop them from re-offending.
- (f) The pilot had been nominated for an award.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

#### 7. THE MARIOS TINENTI CENTRE

A report in respect of the Marios Tinenti Centre (MTC), 91 Russell Street, Loughborough was submitted.

T. Kiernan stated that the centre had been a remarkable success in respect of confidence building in the local community. At a recent meeting of the Council's Community and Safety Partnership Scrutiny Committee, six local residents had given evidence in respect of the positive changes in the area and to their quality of life. Details of the Action Week were given to the meeting.

The Chair noted that the residents now took a pride in their area.

**AGREED** that the information be welcomed.

#### 8. PUB WATCH

A briefing in respect of Pub Watch was given to the meeting by Debbie Smythe, Chair of Pub Watch in Loughborough.

The members of Pub Watch, including licensees, police and council representatives met every six weeks. Licensees included representatives from thirty five public houses, clubs and the University. They received information in respect of members' telephone numbers and email addresses, posters and information in respect of data protection. The meetings included presentations, for example from the Drug Squad.

At the present time there were seven people with between six and twelve month bans from licensed premises in Loughborough. Prior to bans being imposed the Police wrote a letter warning individuals that should they continue to cause

problems they would be banned and after that initial ban it could be extended if not adhered to.

The University advised licensees of exam dates and conferences held at the University, in particular if those conferences were for minors.

In respect of the night time economy, licensees worked with the police and council officers, circulating photographs of those banned from licensed premises and worked with CCTV officers. The majority of licensees had radios to keep in contact with each other.

The Old Packe Arms in Loughborough welcomed football supporters new to Loughborough and any coaches or groups of fans were directed there.

PC Jackson had visited Leicester Pub Watch to compare how the two worked. There were few differences, other than the subscription fees were higher in Leicester.

The Licensees worked with the Street Pastors, for example giving flipflops to girls who had taken off their shoes and collected discarded cans of drink.

In response to a question, D. Smythe stated that during the previous twelve months it had become quieter in Loughborough town centre at night, with more locals than students in the area. The busiest nights were Thursday and Saturday.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

## 9. PREVENTION OF VIOLENT EXTREMISM STRATEGY

A verbal report in respect of the Prevention of Violent Extremism strategy was given by S. Phipps. He stated that Charnwood had been identified as a pathfinder authority, together with Derby, Leicester, Nottingham and Northampton. Funding for the current financial year of £100,000 had been received for projects to strengthen works within communities.

The national focus was on Al Quaida inspired extremism. Locally a multi-agency group, principally statutory agencies with the University and College was considering a number of projects to target groups in the community to restrict violent extremism, including working with the Bengali community, networking with mosques, a South Asian Women's group and young people who were new arrivals in the area. With case management, work would be undertaken with individuals identified as being at risk to move them away from that risk.

The steering group would meet quarterly and link into the County steering group. Nationally the work would be taken forward as a linked delivery group. National prevention implementation would be measured through National Indicator 35, with a number of criteria to assess against. Charnwood was in the process of completing a self assessment for 2009/10.

Officers were being sensitive as to how the funding was rolled out, providing support for communities.

The funding was for one year; therefore the funding would be invested in existing projects.

The Chair stated that further information would be submitted to the Partnership during the year.

**AGREED** that the information be noted.

#### 10. COUNTY COUNCIL LEVEL ACTIVITY

A verbal update report in respect of County level activity was given by G. Samra-Rai as follows:

- (i) Leicestershire County Council Anti-social Behaviour Minimum Standards had been published and action plans would be developed to support the Borough and District Councils. Charnwood was seen as a front runner in the work.
- (ii) Community Safety Partnership Chairs training would take place on 17th and 25th May 2010. The events would be free of charge and held at the County Council offices.
- (iii) Hate Incidents Monitoring Project had produced positive results for Charnwood Borough Council. The Stop and Tell campaign had encouraged reporting. Simon Duran would attend the next meeting of the Partnership to assist with the consideration of the Action Plan.

In response to a question, information in respect of the draft Domestic Abuse Strategy would be emailed to the Chair.

### The All Crime Group Report

The All Crime Group had their first meeting on the 16<sup>th</sup> April and have had a further two meetings since then to develop the action plan which is part of the minutes and to discuss projects for funding that had been approved by the performance group.

The meetings are held at the Probation Offices and are well attended with a free flow of ideas coming from all agencies.

The most challenging target for this group is a Reduction in Burglary which was above target at the end of March 2010. The group are planning for the students returning and developing the action plan that was initiated at the Loughborough burglary workshop. Work has already started in line with action plan the initiated at the Charnwood burglary workshop.

I have also included all the figures for last year for Charnwood LPU to give you a flavour of where we are at present.

**7. Neighbourhood Policing:**

This remains the focus of the 'public facing Police services' on the LPU with the new Neighbourhood Management Sergeant model now well imbedded. It is within Neighbourhood Policing that the majority of delivery work on ASB is done, with the new, temporary recording standards now in place utilising our crime and intelligence system (CIS) prior to a 'partner wide' database system coming in sometime next year. Charnwood LPU will continue (in the interim) to update both Sentinel and CIS which will create additional work for the Neighbourhood Teams but is vital from a partnership information sharing perspective.

**5. Summary:**

The year end results (as above) show a reduction in overall crime, with Serious Acquisitive crime showing a significant decrease although Burglary Dwelling (despite a very significant reduction from the situation in Sept 09) still showed an increase on last year. Vehicle crime also showed a significant reduction. The reduction of Serious Acquisitive (in particular Domestic Burglary) will remain the crime focus for the new performance year.

Whilst reported ASB has shown a 3% increase on last year, the incremental approach as used by the partnership has seen a significant reduction in ASB in Birstall with similar plans either in place or being put in place around the emerging hotspots.

**ASB Delivery Group  
Action Plan (2010 – 2011) Update  
17<sup>th</sup> June 2010**

**AIM 1 – TO INCREASE PUBLIC CONFIDENCE THAT EFFECTIVE ACTION IS BEING TAKEN AGAINST ASB IN THE BOROUGH**

**Thurmaston Action Plan** – An action plan was raised to address an increase in ASB reporting in the village. The action plan was shared with local residents so that they could see precisely what action was being taken, by partners, to address their concerns. The action plan was very well received by local residents who are already reporting a dramatic improvement in the situation. The release of this action plan has been further supported with a press in the Thurmaston Times due for publication in early June.

As an action within the action plan, an ASB Seminar has been arranged in the village, on **16<sup>th</sup> June 2010**. It will provide information to parents and young people about the consequences of getting involved in anti-social behaviour.

**ASB Road Shows** – following last years success with this project, the decision has been made to run them again. They will be rolled out across the summer months of July and August, with at least 5 taking place in Loughborough and 5 in the villages. Work has already commenced on this and it has been agreed that this time we will also be informing people about hate crime and hate incidents as well as ASB, in order to support the new hate incident action group.

**ASB DVD** – work has commenced on the production of an educational DVD. It is being developed in recognition of the fact that not all Charnwood residents are easily able to comprehend detailed, written policy and procedure. It will provide details of how to report ASB and the level of service which can be expected (in line with the recently published ASB Minimum Standards). It will also include details of the victim support available and will include footage of the county court building inside and out.

**AIM 2 – TO REDUCE INCIDENTS OF CRIMINAL DAMAGE AT THE TOP 5 HOTSPOTS FOR CRIMINAL DAMAGE OTHER THAN DWELLINGS**

**Graffiti**

Graffiti has been identified as a concern by year 6 pupils at Booth Wood Primary School, on the Ashby Road Estate and an educational visit was paid to the school to discuss their concerns. Subsequently, the school has bid for some funding to carry out a graffiti workshop and to produce some artwork for display in the local community.

**Analysis**

Requests for comprehensive analysis of Sentinel and other systems will be submitted to the Inter Agency Community Safety Bureau, in order to identify hotspots for low level damage.

### **AIM 3 – REDUCE LEVELS OF ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR AND DELIBERATE FIRES IN IDENTIFIED HOTSPOTS**

#### **Thurmaston ASB Hotspot**

As a result of analysis of available data and of local concern, a multi agency action plan has been raised and is currently being delivered in Thurmaston (priority neighbourhood) to address increased reporting. Early feed back from local residents is indicating a significant reduction in reporting.

#### **IMPACT Team**

The IMPACT Team is currently deployed in Birstall, Thurmaston, Shepshed, Wordsworth Road (The Ville) and Anstey, all of which have been identified as ASB hotspots.

#### **5 – A side Football Tournament**

A 5 aside football tournament is being planned for delivery in priority neighbourhoods, to engage young people at risk of becoming involved in anti-social behaviour across the school holidays.

#### **ASB Interventions**

The incremental approach continues to be used with individuals identified as perpetrating anti-social behaviour. The ASB Steering Group is currently monitoring 36 live Acceptable Behaviour contract, raised with people who have perpetrated ASB in hotspot locations, 10 of which have been raised since April 2010.

Court proceedings have just been commenced, to obtain injunctions against 2 individuals living on the Warwick Way Estate (priority neighbourhood).

### **AIM 4 – TO TARGET EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES AND PROGRAMMES AT YOUNG PEOPLE IDENTIFIED AS AT RISK OF BECOMING OFFENDERS**

#### **Charnwood Mentoring Scheme**

22 young people at risk of becoming offenders are currently engaged in mentoring relationships, with 5 of these having been newly matched since April 2010. 30 mentors have been trained and 4 new mentors have been identified and are due to commence training any time now.

#### **Acceptable Behaviour Contract Schools Programme**

One new school has been identified since April 2010. This is Trinity College on the Peel Drive Estate (priority neighbourhood). The programme will be due to commence any time now, with all relevant staff having been briefed. Trinity College was chosen as the first school this year as incident reporting highlighted it as a hotspot for ASB.

### **Launch of the Alternative Incremental Process**

The launch will take place at the Town Hall on the 25<sup>th</sup> June 2010. So far 75 individuals from across the Charnwood Partnership and from agencies in other counties in the region have accepted invitations to the event.

### **Young People's Community Achievement Awards**

Charnwood's Youth Council has agreed to take ownership of delivering a young people's award scheme in Charnwood. Further updates will be provided in subsequent reports.

## **AIM 5 – TO ENSURE EFFECTIVE PARTNERSHIP WORKING IN OUR PRIORITY NEIGHBOURHOODS TO REDUCE CRIME AND DISORDER**

### **Sentinel ASB Case Management**

Work has commenced to extend the use of Sentinel to other partners. It is hoped that we can encourage at least one Registered Social Landlords to adopt Sentinel as their ASB Case Management system, ensuring the effective exchange of ASB related information between a greater number of agencies.

### **Hate Crime and Incident Reporting – Use of sentinel for case management**

Discussions have taken place with HREC and agreement has been reached that they will adopt Sentinel to case manage their reported hate incidents. The necessary development work has already been discussed and agreed with the suppliers of sentinel and it is hoped that the project will go live, in the next 2 months. This will ensure the effective sharing of information between partners to assist to reduce crime and disorder.

## **AIM 6 – TO IDENTIFY AND WORK WITH INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE AT RISK OF OFFENDING THROUGH THE PREVENT AND DETER STRAND OF THE IDENTIFIED PROLIFIC AND PRIORITY OFFENDER SCHEME**

### **Local Offender Management Panel and Integrated Offender Management**

Every effort will be made to ensure adequate and appropriate representation at these 2 meetings to ensure that individuals in need of ASB intervention and support are identified.

## **AIM 7 – ENSURE EFFECTIVE PARTNERSHIP WORKING IN SPECIFIED LOCAL AREAS AS IDENTIFIED BY THE ASB DELIVERY GROUP**

### **Multi Agency Working Groups**

Since the beginning of April 2010, 11 new problem profiles (both person and location specific) have been identified and multi agency working groups have been established to address the issues raised by the delivery group.

Our five objectives to be used within in each action plan, **Prevention**, **Engagement**, **Reassurance**, **Enforcement** and **Intelligence** building on our last strategy, broadening the emphasis into the preventative and reassurance areas of community safety.

2. that residents and community groups in Hastings Ward had turned the area into a community to be proud of and that the Borough Council, and its strategic partners, continue to provide proactive support to the community and use this as a model to provide similar support to other community projects in order to achieve similar outcomes;
3. that the role of the multi-agency approach to anti-social behaviour was significant to the success of reducing crime and anti-social behaviour and re-building community confidence; and
4. that the education awareness programme concerning burglary and thefts, particularly in student communities, be continued.

Reasons

1. To ensure relevant support for and progress in the community on a permanent basis. The support of the Borough Council along with the strategic partners was pivotal in ensuring that the improvements to community safety and community cohesion were maintained and further strengthened.
2. To ensure that the improved sense of confidence in the community would be maintained and to ensure that new projects, for example, Warwick Way, would be equally successful.
3. To maintain a high profile and professional presence and to continue to respond quickly to community need, including direct intervention, where appropriate.
4. To ensure that the reductions achieved this year concerning burglary and theft, particularly among new students in Loughborough, continued to be maintained.
